The School of Management at Kristu Jayanti College observed Gandhi Jayanti with a meaningful program that celebrated the enduring legacy of Mahatma Gandhi, the Father of the Nation. Ms Tasmia, an MBA student, delivered an inspiring speech about the importance of the International Day of Non-Violence, urging everyone to incorporate Gandhian values into their daily lives. This was followed by an engaging audio-visual presentation by Mr Miron, which chronicled Gandhi's journey from a barrister to the revered Mahatma. An interactive quiz led by Mr Geo Joju and Ms Vinodhini tested participants' knowledge of Gandhi's life and philosophy. The quiz encouraged
